#### Breaking the Cycle of Poverty

To honor our heritage in Jefferson County, we contributed to the Jeffco Prosperity Project, a collaborative effort to help families break the cycle of generational poverty.

The Jeffco Prosperity Project realigns existing services and empowers families to develop economic self-sufficiency. It also offers families the services they need to support their children through school. Families are helped until the youngest child graduates from high school, ensuring that today's low-income students become tomorrow's successful adults.

The Jeffco Prosperity Project is a collaboration among The Action Center, the Jefferson County Department of Human Services and its

Head Start programs and Jeffco Schools Foundation in partnership with Jefferson County Public Schools.

Community First Foundation is proud to support the Jeffco Prosperity Project through a \$388,351 grant given over three years. A large portion of the grant is covering the costs of a program director to ensure the success of this new, collaborative project.

#### **Expanding Services for Basic Needs**

The Action Center provides an immediate response to basic human needs and promotes

pathways to self-sufficiency for families living in Jefferson County. Because needs are greater than capacity, The Action Center raised funds

for a facilities expansion. Community First Foundation provided a \$500,000 challenge grant to stimulate giving and support their efforts to purchase and renovate a new Program Services building. At the center of the expansion is the innovative Self-Sufficiency Pathways Program. In the program, individuals and families participate in case-management sessions designed to improve educational and financial management skills as they work

towards self-sufficiency. The program has great potential to help people make meaninaful and sustainable changes in their lives.

### Supporting Health Professions Expansion at Red Rocks Community College

Community First Foundation contributed one of the largest gifts in our history to help

build the new Arvada Health
Professions and Science
Building at Red Rocks
Community College, Our

Foundation for helping us move closer to our goal of producing highly qualified primary care health professionals to meet the growing needs of Jefferson County's largest industry – health and wellness," says Dr. Michele Haney, president of Red Rocks Community College.

The expanded campus will also serve as a regional triage center for crisis response and a community resource for continuing education. Once completed, the Arvada campus will provide Jefferson County with an educational training center that supports a rich, collaborative learning environment dedicated to the health and wellness of Jefferson County and the surrounding areas.

Community First Foundation awarded more than \$42 million in grants in 2014.

### ColoradoGives.org Changing the Landscape of Online Giving

ColoradoGives.org, the online giving website, ended the year stronger than ever as \$35.8 million was raised through the site in 2014. That's a 25 percent increase in giving over 2013. And spanning the eight years since the site's inception, donors used ColoradoGives.org to support Colorado nonprofits with more than \$117 million in donations.

#### COLORADO GIVES DAY 2014: \$26.3 MILLION IN 24 HOURS

The fifth Colorado Gives Day launched with one of the largest incentives in the nation: Community First Foundation and Corporate Partner FirstBank each contributed \$500,000 to create the \$1 Million Incentive Fund to increase the value of every dollar donated. A surprise gift of \$150,000 from the Colorado Health Foundation meant every donation went even further. Online giving results surpassed the previous year yet again, with \$26.3 million donated to 1,677 nonprofits from nearly 44,000 donors.



#### Corporate Challenge Inspires Corporate Philanthropy

A Corporate Challenge pilot program launched in 2014 to encourage business participation in Colorado Gives Day. The challenge was designed for Colorado businesses and their employees to take an active, public role in supporting local nonprofits and encourage a philanthropic spirit. It resulted in 600 generous employees donating more than \$356,000 to 580 nonprofits. Peak to Peak Charter School



The following nonprofits are just a few organizations that received \$10,000 Endowment Challenge Grants from Community First Foundation to support their endowment-building campaigns.

#### **Glory Community**

Glory Community, a residential community for adults with developmental disabilities, established an endowment to provide tuition scholarships for families in need.

#### **Phamaly Theatre Company**

New financial resources generated from their first endowment will help Phamaly Theatre Company support their performers and pursue their long-term vision to offer theater programming to youth with disabilities.

#### Peak to Peak Charter School

Peak to Peak Charter School offers a K-12 liberal arts and college preparatory curriculum. To ensure that financial need is not a barrier for the graduates to attend college, the school created an endowment to fund four-year scholarships.

### The Franklin Fund: Making a Difference for Women and Girls of Color

At the end of every year, and again at tax time, MaryAnn Franklin would find herself buried in paper trying to keep track of her many charitable donations. That

changed when she set up a donor-advised fund through Community
First Foundation to help make her widespread philanthropy
more efficient.

MaryAnn wants to help make sure Historically Black Colleges and Universities are around to nurture future generations of students, as she was nurtured by one years ago. Her donoradvised fund at Community First Foundation is helping that happen. MaryAnn attended Fisk University, one of the nation's top Historically

Black Colleges and Universities, which will receive her support. Her fund will also support groups helping women and girls of color become self-sufficient. For example, MaryAnn supports the Women's Foundation of Colorado because it builds resources and promotes change to help women and girls in Colorado achieve their full potential.

## The Raymond and Viola Wagner Family Fund: Family's Good Fortune Benefits Home Town

Raymond and Viola Wagner, of Otis, Kansas,

operated a wheat and cattle farm
when an oil strike on their land
dramatically changed their
fortunes. Raymond wanted
the income generated from the
wells to provide not only for his
family, but also for the local charities
that enrich his small community.

The search for an experienced community foundation to guide them led the Wagners to Community First Foundation in the Denver area, where eldest son Dale had started a family. They created a donor-advised fund to receive tax deductions during the wells' oil-producing years and allow the family to support charities for years to come.

Assigning six family advisors to the fund makes giving a family affair. "We want to make sure that once we're gone, the grandchildren will continue giving," said Dale. Many of the grants from the fund benefit graduates of their home town high school by providing scholarships to local colleges and trade schools. Other charities include the County Fair Board, the City Teen Center, the county food bank, Kansas Honor Flight and the local 4H Club.

"I like the comfort of knowing that I'm working with individuals who are very knowledgeable about charitable funds and financial markets," Dale said about Community First Foundation. "And we wanted to be comfortable with them, because we're just normal, down-home folk."

#### MENTAL WELLNESS IS A NEW STRATEGIC PRIORITY

In mid-2014, we conducted a community listening tour to learn more about the mental health environment in the Denver metropolitan area. Consistently, we heard there is a great need for more programs that promote mental wellness and prevent mental illness. As a result, our Board of Directors committed to fostering partnerships and working collaboratively with others to address this challenging social issue.

> We began our work by funding organizations focused on reducing toxic stress in the very young. Toxic stress is a condition that occurs when a child experiences strong, frequent and/or prolonged adversity without adequate adult support. The impact on a child's stress response system can have negative long-term effects on physical and behavioral functions into adult years.
